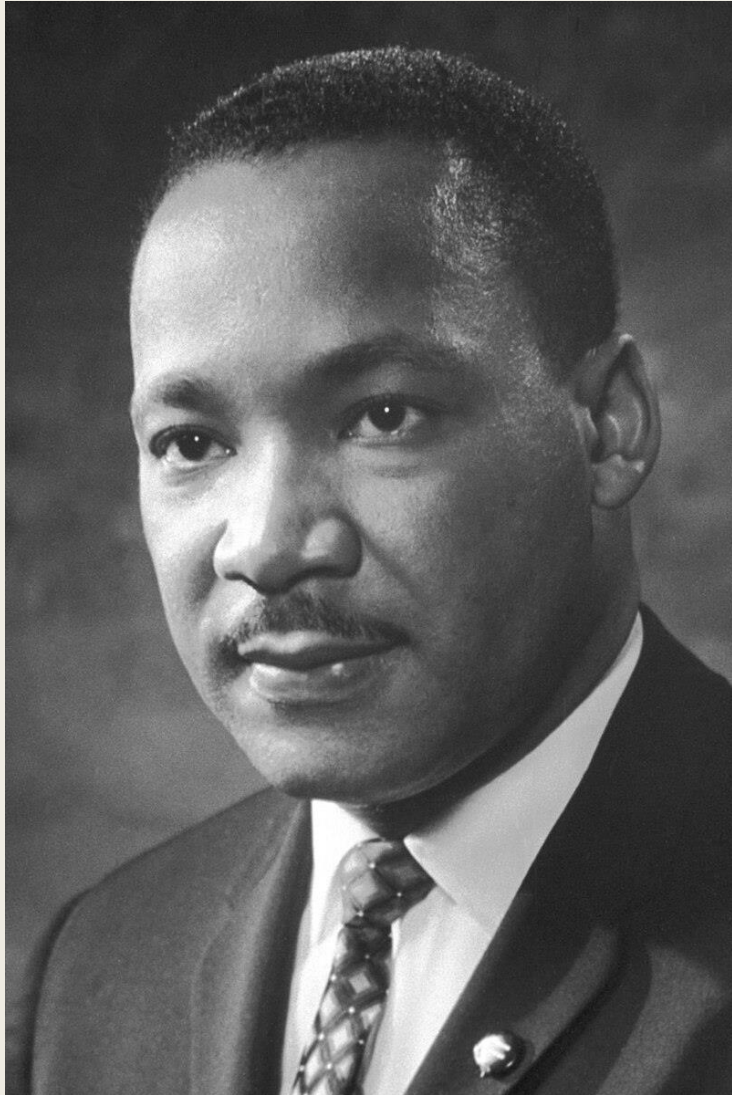
What's the common purpose?

go

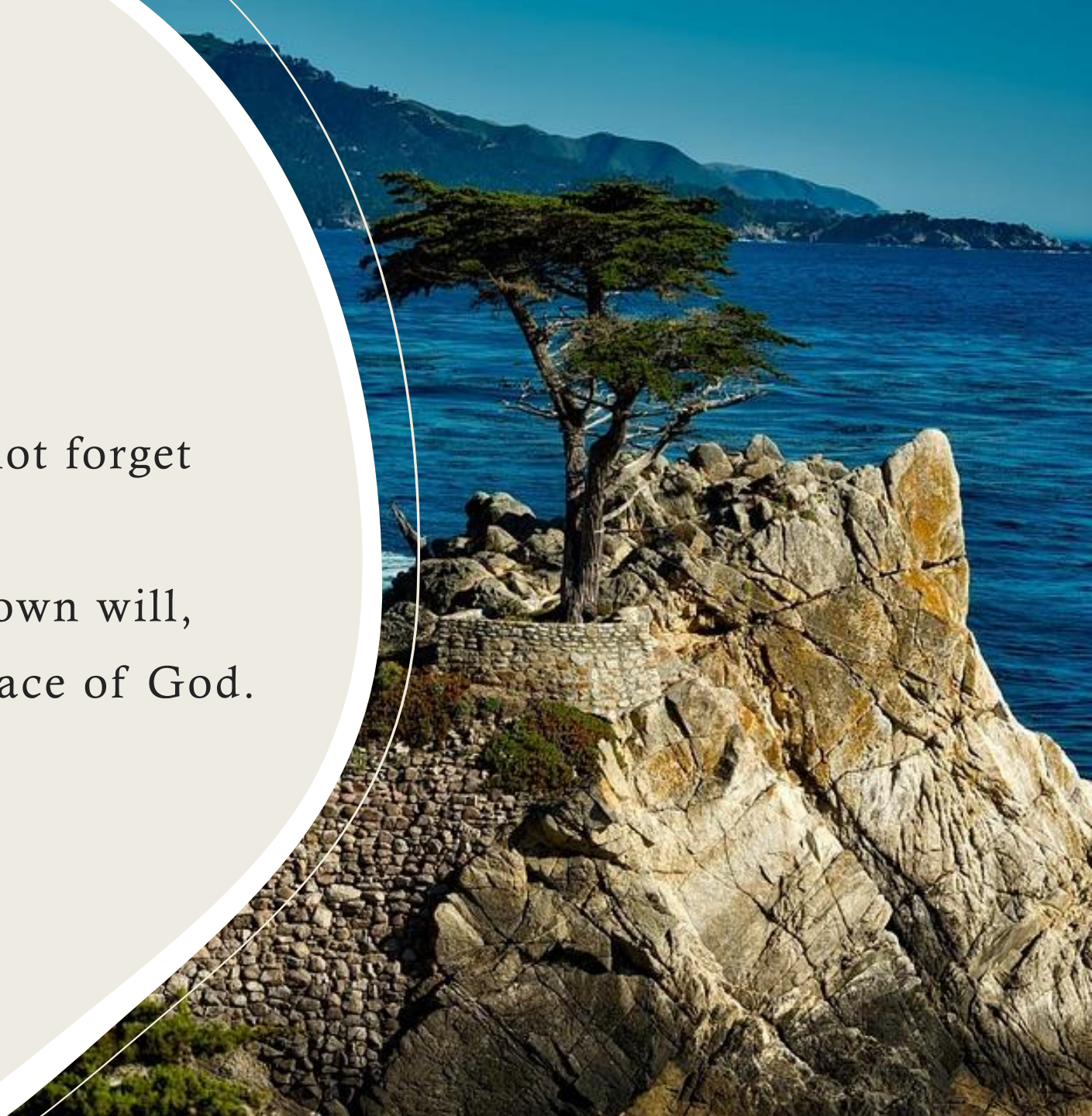
Texts – what's the point?

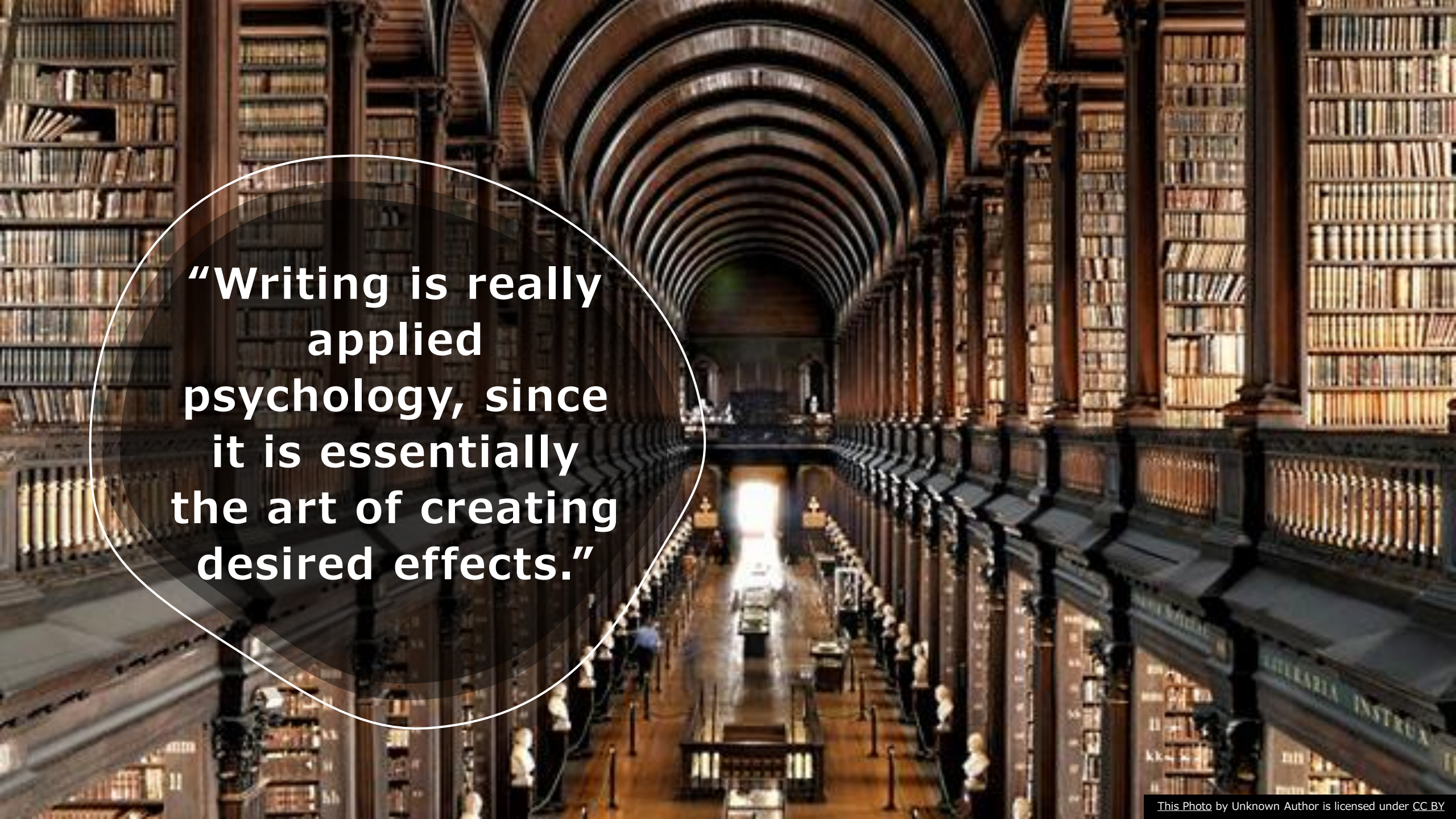
- Repository of information

- **The editor's role is to make that tool as effective as possible**

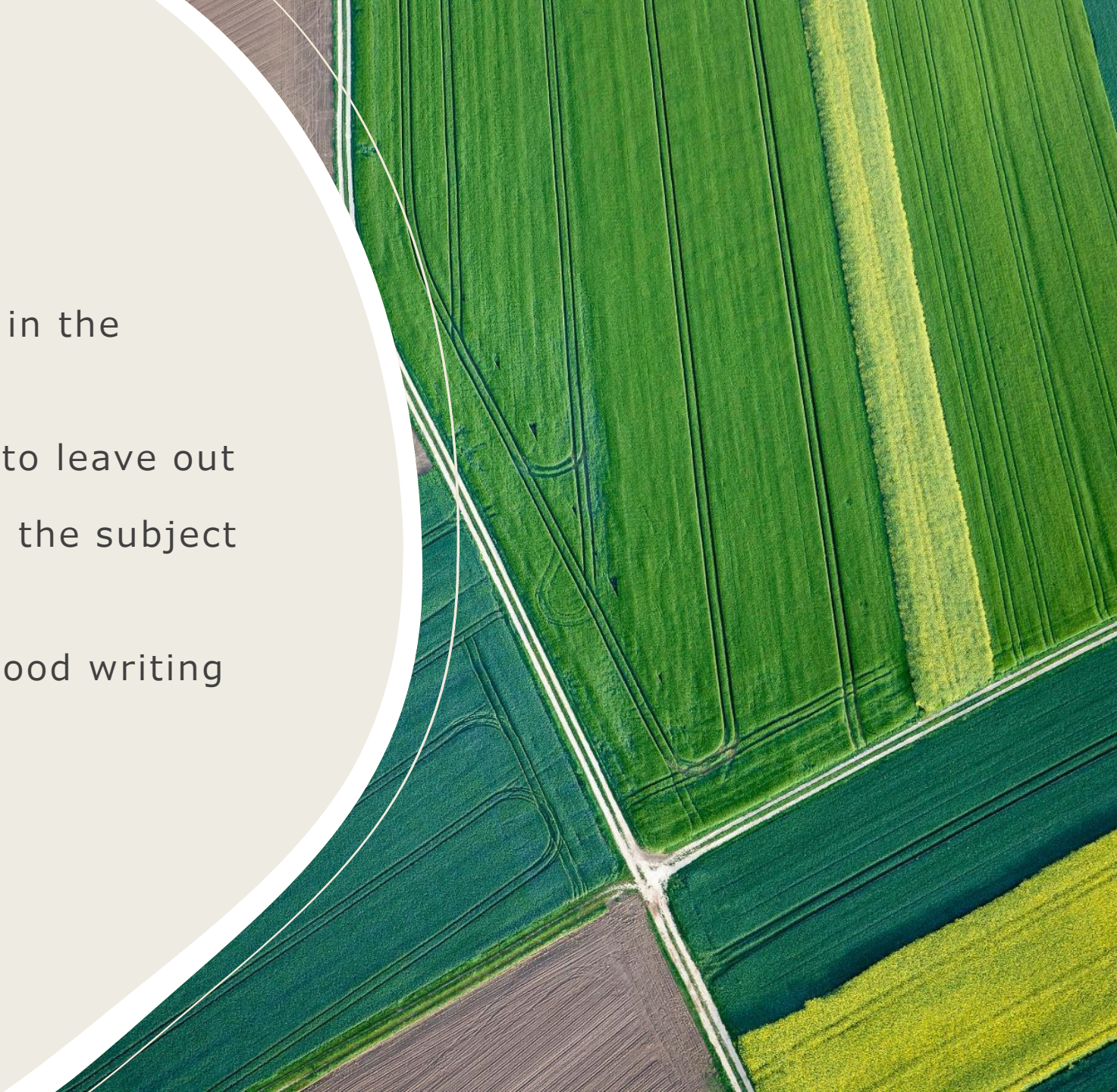

What do authors do instead?

- Use texts as a repository of knowledge – a “notebook”
- They say more than we need to
- They write in our own terms, not the reader’s
- **They write for themselves, not for their readers**



- Sometimes: they aren't experts in the subject area
- Expertise involves knowing what to leave out
- Other times: they are experts in the subject area
- But they don't see the need for good writing

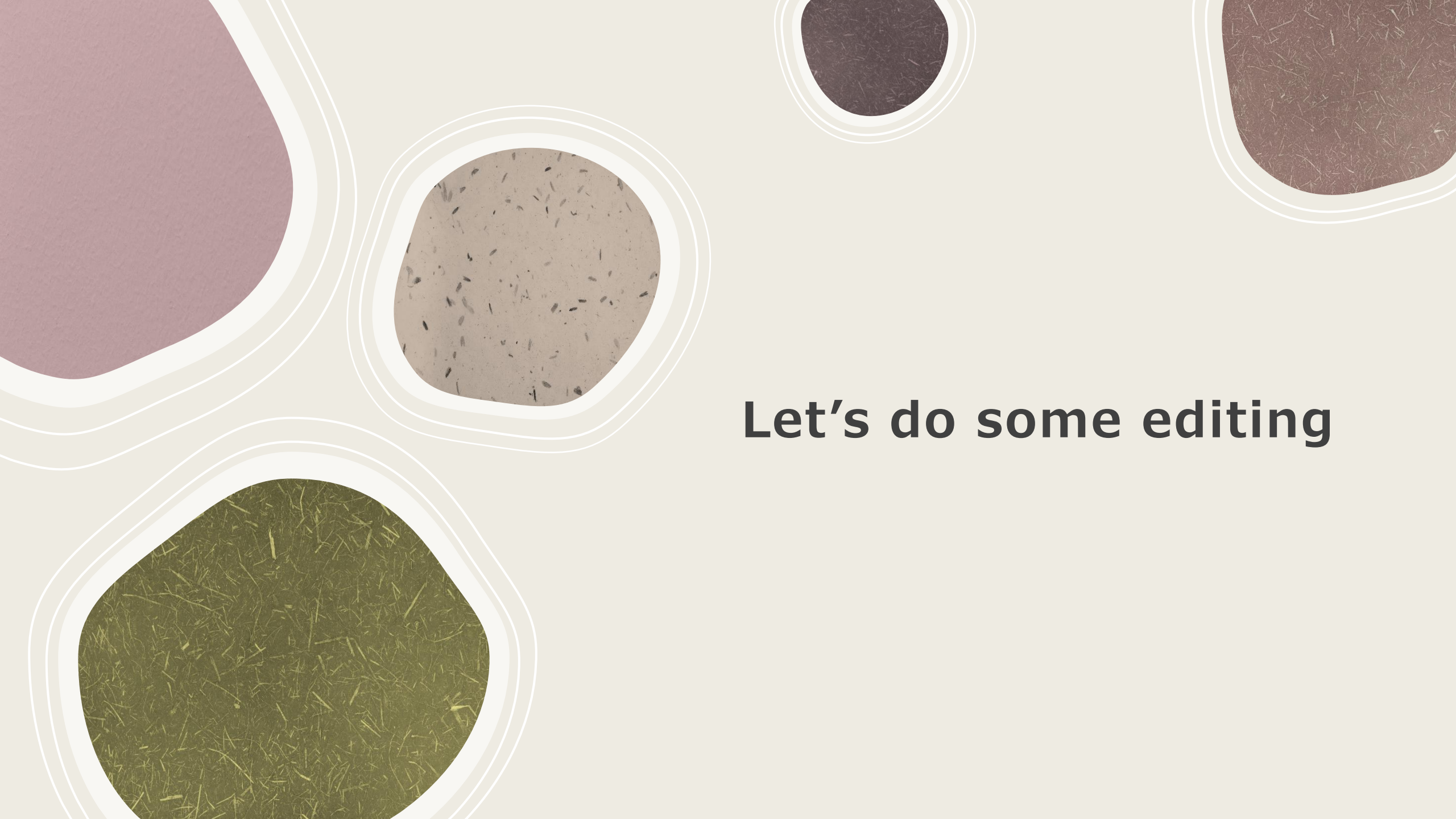
Editing solves everyone's problems

- They make sure terminology is consistent
- They make sure the text makes sense grammatically
- They check facts and data
- **When they find unclear parts, they rewrite them more effectively**
- **They cut out repetition and excess detail**
- **Editors are the first people who read a text as a reader, not as an author**
 - **“Reader’s advocate”**

What are we trying to do?

- We want our clients' texts to elicit the reaction from their readers that the author intended

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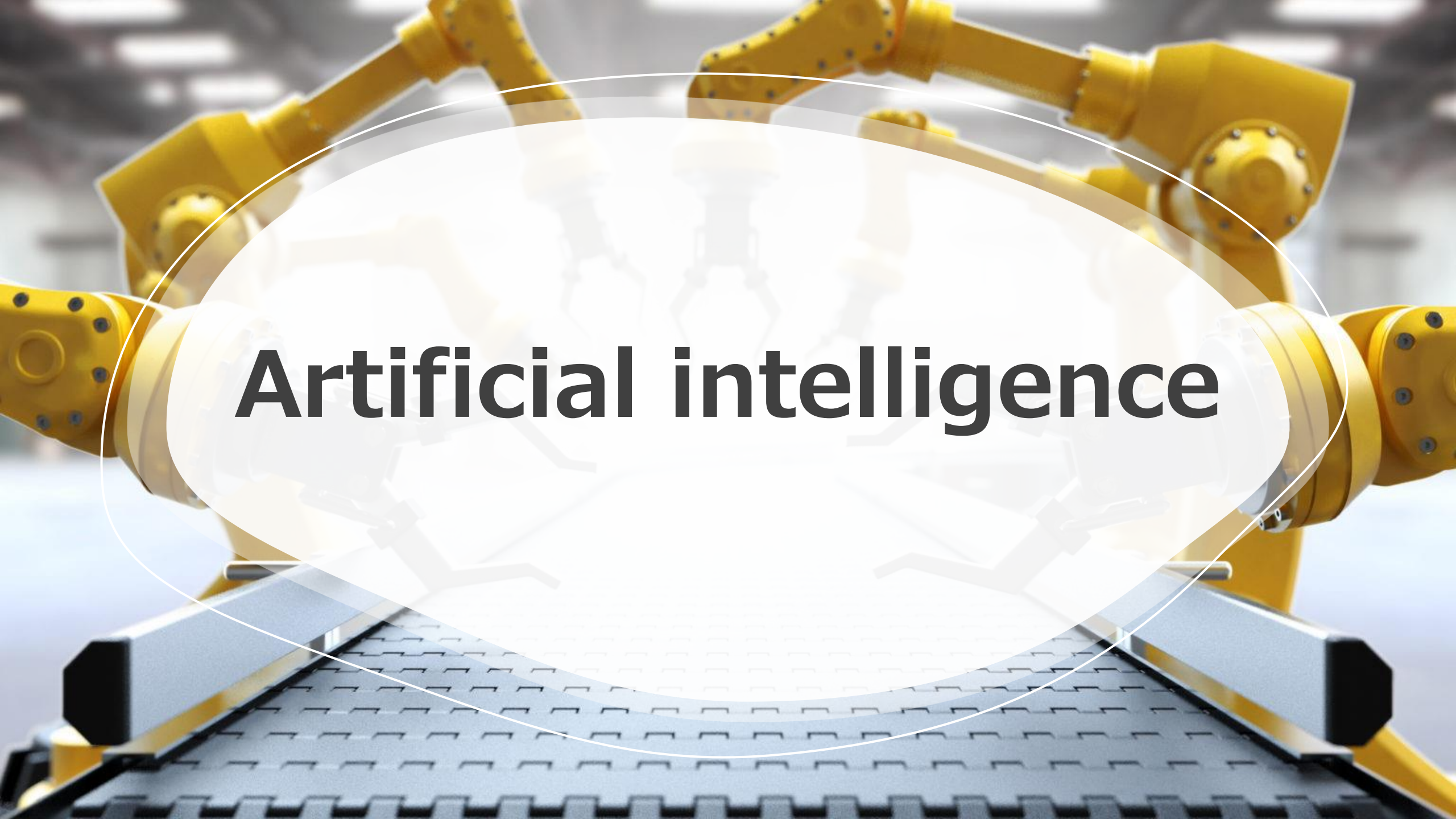
